
Designing Mobile Interaction for Low-Literacy (D-MILL)

Call for Participation

This workshop will provide a forum and an opportunity for researcher, practitioners, and designers to discuss and share ideas on interaction design knowledge for low-literacy. In this one-day workshop, we aims to: (1) explore perspectives of interaction design knowledge for low-literacy and (2) establish a common ground to develop a reusable design advice for low-literacy. Both objectives aim towards creating a community that consists both the HCI4D researcher, practitioners and designers that have shared understanding and leverage the use of interaction design knowledge.

The workshop will focus on the following issues but are not limited:

- How can we develop and share a reusable design knowledge for mobile low-literacy
- What generic and contextual factors determine mobile interaction design for low-literacy?
- What underlying principles, techniques and tools call for low-literacy design?
- What low-literacy design philosophy and techniques implicates?
- What opportunities and challenges involve in creating and sharing interaction design knowledge?

We aim to produce a refined position statement and further develop a platform to work together on interac-

tion design knowledge repository for low-literacy. The resulting outcome will include:

- A workshop summary and position statement
- Refined position papers – towards the main goal of the workshop
- Further discussion will continue on the issue online to further develop a comprehensive interaction pattern library for low-literacy.

Submissions

We invite 2-4 pages submissions in CHI ACM Extended Abstract Format. The deadline for submission will be on June 14, 2016. Notification of acceptance will be made on July 05, 2016. Final revised submissions will be due on July 25, 2016.

All submissions will be reviewed by the workshop organizers and/or their collaborators and the selection will be based on the contribution originality, argument, and insight to the workshop goals and to foster discussion. All accepted submissions will be made available in advance both via emails to the participants and the workshop website to facilitate fruitful discussion during the workshop.
